EDITORIAL

In the absence of President Kabila and the political leader of M23, in Kampala <u>talks</u> between the DRC Government and the rebel movement finally started, amid serious <u>tensions</u> and regarded with a considerable amount of scepticism by many Congolese.

At an extraordinary summit of the <u>SADC</u> South African nations pledged to provide 4,000 troops for the International Neutral Forces to be deployed in eastern DRC.

While in <u>Goma</u> the air and lake traffic resumed, Uganda reopened the <u>Bunagana</u> border post, presumably still controlled by M23.

Reportedly about 20 <u>Rwandan soldiers</u> are detained in Kinshasa after they were arrested in Goma in the ranks of the M23 rebels that occupied Goma.

The <u>UN</u> is investigating recent rapes and other human rights violations by both M23 and the Congolese army.

The <u>US</u> administration is criticized for its weak response to the crisis in the DRC, especially in its stance towards Rwanda.

In the <u>Central African Republic</u>, the UFDR rebel group has taken up the arms again and reportedly seized three towns in the northeast.

A historic Africa-wide <u>treaty</u> protecting people displaced within their own countries (IDP) came into force last week.

The Ugandan parliament passed a controversial <u>petroleum bill</u>, giving discretionary power to the Minister of Energy to grant or revoke oil licenses.
